Streptococcus Iniae

Occupational Bacterial Infection from Handling Fish

What is Streptococcus iniae?

Streptococcus iniae is a zoonotic pathogen that infects fish and people. It is found worldwide and can spread from fish as well as spread person to person.

How does infection occur?

Direct contact with an open wound or broken skin when handling a live or freshly killed fish can result in an infection.

What are the symptoms?

Symptoms include swelling and redness at the site of infection. Blood may become poisoned by bacteria (septicemia). Arthritis, fever, abdominal bloating, and pneumonia are also known symptoms. Most people affected are over 50 years old or immunocompromised.

How do I prevent it?

Avoid any contact with fish when you have an open wound. Wear appropriate PPE (such as gloves) when handling fish.

How is it treated?

Streptococcus iniae is treated with antibiotics.
